21st – Our Venerable Father, **Simeon**, surnamed Salus (fool) and **John**, his cofaster, Hermits. Simeon lived as a hermit in a desert for nearly 30 years near the Red Sea but, afterwards at Emesus in Syria. — **St Ezekiel**, the Third of the Four Greater Prophets and writer of a Canonical Book of Scriptures. Tradition says he was put to death while in captivity in Babylon by one of the Jewish Headmen turned pagan, 525 B.C.

22nd – **St. Mary Magdalene**, Myrrh-Bearer and Equal to the Apostles. According to Catholic view, she is one and the same with Mary the Sinner, Mary of Bethany, the sister of Lazarus and Martha, the Magdalen at the foot of the Cross, and at the Tomb and the first witness to the Resurrection. — **Return of the Relics of St. Phocas**, Priest-Martyr, a Bishop of Sinope. His relics were translated to Vienne in France in the 13th century (Confer September 22).

23rd – SS. Trophimus, Theophilus and others with them, suffered martyrdom by beheading about A.D. 302, during the reign of Diocletian, Emperor. — St. Apollynaris, Priest-Martyr, appointed first Bishop of Ravenna by St. Peter, died in the reign of Vespasian, Emperor A.D. 79.

24th – **SS. Boris and Gleb,** Martyrs, in their baptism had taken the names of **Romanus and David**, were Princes, sons of St. Vladimir, the first Christian Grand Duke of "Rus." They died A.D. 1010. — **St Christina**, Martyr, was tortured and put to death at Lucas Vulsinus in Tuscany, Italy, A.D. 200, during the reign of Septimius Severus, Emperor.

25th – **Dormition of St. Anna,** Mother of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God. (Confer Dec 8). Blessed Anna was descended from Aaron, being the daughter of the Priest Nathan and his wife Mary, from the tribe of Levi. She was born about the year 80 B.C. She was married to Joachim and was childless for about 50 years. This saddened them and they vowed that, should the Lord bless them with a child, they would dedicate it to Him. Hoping their prayers would be answered; they brought gifts to the Lord's Temple in Jerusalem on the yearly Feast of the Dedication and Feast of Lights. The Priests, however, did not wish to accept them, since they were from a childless man. Though publicly humiliated, Joachim soon remembered that God had given a son to Abraham in his old age. He retired to the wilderness to pray and there the Archangel Gabriel told him that his prayers had been heard, and that Anna would give birth to a daughter, who would be called Mary. The same Archangel appeared to Anna and told her the same.

26th – **SS. Hermolaus,** Priest-Martyr and two brothers, **Hermippas and Thermocrates,** martyred about 300 A.D., in Nicomedia, the residence of the Emperor Diocletian. — **St. Parasceva**, Venerable Martyr.

27th – **Pantaleon or Panteleimon,** The Great Martyr and Imperial physician, reckoned with St. Luke, Apostle, Patron of medical men. He suffered death by beheading about A.D. 303, during the reign of Maximian, Emperor. — Our Venerable Mother, **Authusa**, mother of St. John Chrysostom. — **St. Clement of Ochrid.** Wonderworker.

Glory to Jesus Christ

Blessed Basil Hopko is considered one of the many priests and religious martyred by Communism. He was born in Slovakia to poor parents. His father died when he was a year old and his mother left for the United States when he was four, in search of work.

He remained in Europe and was an excellent student. He wanted to join his mother in the United States and pursue his vocation to the priesthood there, but his poor health did not permit him to travel.

He was ordained in 1929 and served as a parish priest in Prague, with a special mission to assist the poor, unemployed, and students. In 1947, he was named auxiliary bishop of Prjashev. Three years later, he was arrested by Communist officials and tortured. He was given a trial and sentenced to 15 years for "subversive activity." His health failed as he was continually tortured. In 1964, he was transferred to a home for seniors. There, he was kept under guard, but managed to minister to a group of 120 nuns, who had been imprisoned in the home as well. Though his eparchy was restored in 1968, officials did not permit him to resume his leadership. A Slovak bishop was appointed in his place. He never recovered from his health and died in 1976. He was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 2003 in the Slovak Republic
